ISSUE 28 FACTS: 4-MIL GOLF MANOR RENEWAL

There are seven property tax levies in force in Golf Manor. These are listed in order of date of renewal in the Table on this page. The third entry in the Table is the levy Council voted to place on the ballot this fall as a renewal. This operating levy generates approximately \$172,000 dollars for the general fund. **THE TAX RATE WILL REMAIN AT 4-MILLS AND YOUR TAXES PAID TO THE VILLAGE WILL NOT INCREASE.** For a \$100,000 home, the cost is \$119 per year, identical to your previous tax bill.


For 2012, the Village will run on a budget of about ~\$3.6 million. That sum is equivalent to the operating budget of 80 homes at the median income in Golf Manor of \$45,000. The service director, fire chief and police chief have made every effort to cut expenses over the last 10 years. In addition, they continuously examine all procedures, policies and service providers to make sure the Village is obtaining the best possible value. Our tax department and mayor’s court continue to exercise aggressive collection programs that are bringing in delinquent taxes due the village.

The majority of the money in the general fund (~\$2.5 million per year) comes from local payroll tax (1.7% in Golf Manor), property tax, and fire/emergency medical service (EMS) contracts with other communities. EMS contracts contribute \$365,000 to the general fund. Billing insurance companies for ambulance services generates an additional ~\$125,000 in income. (Note: Golf Manor residents owe only what their insurance companies cover for this service.)

The Village is funding redevelopment activities fully or in part with grants, nearly \$2.5 million dollars to date. Redevelopment activities include projects such as street resurfacing, parks, streetscaping, razing abandoned buildings, community beautification, and rehabbing homes.

One final piece of information is presented in the Figure below. This is a breakdown of your total tax bill based on taxing authority. Golf Manor will receive 37% of your total property taxes in 2012.

FOCUS ON EMPLOYEES: FIRE CHIEF GREGG BALLMAN BY MAYOR ZAFFIRO

Fire Chief Gregg Ballman moved to Golf Manor with his family in 1958 and has served Golf Manor his entire professional life. First joining the Golf Manor Fire Department in 1974 as a volunteer, Gregg brings an extraordinary depth of experience to the job. He is a Fire Safety Inspector, Firefighter II (Ohio Department of Public Safety), Paramedic, Paramedic Instructor, Ohio Peace Officer, Hazardous Material Technician, and an American Heart Association Basic and Advanced Life Support Instructor. Gregg is currently teaching Advanced Cardiac Life Support at TriHealth Corporate Education; he previously taught at the University of Cincinnati Paramedic Training Program, and at the Bethesda Hospital Paramedic Training Program. The chief holds multiple certifications in Disaster Management and Incident Command.

In 1977, the Village hired Gregg as a full-time fireman. He was promoted to Captain in 1979, Assistant Chief in 1982, and Chief in 1989. Gregg is an excellent administrator, leader, and advocate for the fire department. Perhaps Gregg's most noteworthy talent is the ability to attract dedicated and skillful individuals to serve on our team. I am sure he ranks this as his most significant accomplishment. Gregg's work to create the modern, professional fire department that we now enjoy is best described in this short history that I asked him to provide:

"When I became Chief in 1989, the only full-time position was the Fire Chief. I benefited tremendously by inheriting a great staff with a history of great leadership and the overwhelming support of a wonderful community. We were staffed by a very dedicated and talented group of volunteers who responded to emergencies from their homes. As training requirements became more time consuming and lifestyles changed, people had less time to volunteer. It was clear that survival of the Golf Manor Fire Department would require significant change. I have been privileged to oversee a transition from a volunteer fire department to what is commonly referred to as a combination department composed of full time, part time and volunteer personnel. That transition has not been easy. Through community support, action by Village Council and the professionalism of the fire department, we now have a department of five full time and thirty part time personnel, allowing us to maintain our minimum staffing 24 hours a day.

The paramedic service that we enjoy today also didn't come easily. The Academy of Medicine which sets local regulations for community paramedic services required two paramedics on duty 24 hours a day. I was full time with the department when becoming a paramedic in 1982, but I also volunteered during my time off with other department volunteers to help maintain our required minimum staffing. Staffing two paramedics 24 hours a day with volunteers was always tough. At one point, before funding was available for hiring part time personal, I was one of five paramedics working some pretty long hours to fill the paramedic schedule. I'm very proud of everyone who gave their time and expertise to make our paramedic program happen, and am especially proud of those handful who kept it alive during those very tough times.

Transformation from a volunteer department to a paid staff unfortunately also requires a much larger annual budget. I am very proud of the fact that our residents have twice expressed their overwhelming confidence and appreciation of our service by providing the fire department with the funding we needed to operate. Our first fire levy passed in 2000 and a replacement levy passed in 2010; both by large majorities that did not go unnoticed or unappreciated by our staff. Without community support we could not provide the level of services we do today. In fact the reality is that we could not exist in today's environment without adequate funding.

Today we are a well-equipped and well-trained modern fire department with broad versatile skills and talents. The many achievements I've shared with so many in reaching that goal are far too numerous to fairly detail. My mission for the remainder of my career is to continue our progress, leave our next fire chief with the resources he'll need to continue to evolve the department, and to hopefully enjoy those same experiences and achievements."

Gregg married his wife, Kathe, in 1977 and lived on Yosemite until 2010. He has three children, Jennifer, Christy and Casey. Casey, who lives in the village, is a lieutenant with the Golf Manor Fire Department.

The Golf Manor Fire Department makes ~1350 runs per year. We provide fire and paramedic services to Columbia Township and Amberley Village under contract with those jurisdictions. Gregg was instrumental in developing these relationships (and maintaining them), which supplement our budget and enhance the reputation of the Golf Manor Fire Department within the greater Cincinnati safety community.

THE CARING PLACE OF CINCINNATI WINS \$20,000 GRANT FOR GOLF MANOR PARK PROJECT

Early this year, **The Caring Place** applied for a grant from the Greater Cincinnati Foundation to assist Golf Manor with the required matching funds for an Ohio NatureWorks grant, submitted by Golf Manor. If awarded, the NatureWorks grant will be used to construct new facilities in Golf Manor's Volunteer Park in 2013 after demolition of the pool is completed this fall. The required local match is \$26,600. Golf Manor committed \$6,600 in materials and in-kind labor, leaving a \$20,000 cash commitment needed to support the NatureWorks application. We are pleased to announce that the **Robert J. and Patricia Erman Fund of The Greater Cincinnati Foundation** took an interest in our project and awarded the \$20,000 needed to keep the park project alive to The Caring Place.

Please join the mayor and council in thanking the members of the Caring Place Executive Board and especially, Jim Valentine, who took the lead on the GCF application. The Caring Place was established in 1982 by a coalition of churches serving Golf Manor, Kennedy Heights, Pleasant Ridge, and Silverton. Their mission is to provide food, clothing, furniture, rent and utility assistance, family development, and support groups to distressed residents in member communities. They also look for opportunities to assist member communities with urban renewal and community-building projects. The Caring Place has enjoyed a mutually supportive relationship with Golf Manor. In 1999, The Caring Place donated \$10,000 from an endowment to serve as matching funds for the initial redevelopment of Volunteer Park. Volunteer organizations within Golf Manor collect food and clothing for The Caring Place, and the Village advertises their programs in *The Villager*. A Golf Manor official, Donna Faulk, has served on the Caring Place Executive Board. The Caring Place (841-1499) and Golf Manor share a common mission to serve the needs of all who choose to live in our area.



The Greater Cincinnati Foundation (www.gcdfn.org) is a non-profit organization serving as the Tristate region's community foundation. The GCF helps donors make the most of their giving to build a better community. Their mission is to use the power of philanthropy to change the lives of people and build strong communities. The GCF provides grants in six key areas: arts and culture, community and economic development, education, the environment, health, and human services. A good example of a similar project to ours, funded by the GCF, is the Glenwood Gardens in Woodlawn. An effective steward of the Community's charitable resources since 1963, GCF inspires philanthropy in eight counties in Ohio, Kentucky, and Indiana.

Our project is aligned with GCF's goal of community development. The new park will promote public health and community building by creating a safe, attractive place for family-oriented activities, including exercise, social events, and recreational opportunities. The proposed park elements, especially the amphitheater, picnic grove and renovated shelter, will encourage program development to make free cultural and educational events available to those otherwise unable to afford them. The renovated park will improve the image of Golf Manor and surrounding communities and stimulate new investment in area residential and commercial districts.

Dan has three children: Kyle (27), John (24), and Diana (20). Connie has one daughter: Christina (24).


FIRST NATIONAL NIGHT OUT A SUCCESS IN GOLF MANOR
